# **Annual Report 2018**

Dear friends,

It is my privilege to present the Annual Report of the year 2018. Before detailing the programmes and activities carried out or participated in the year of reporting, I would like to say something about Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL), a component of Prime Minister's Kaushal Vikas Yojana (PMKVY) and the status of its implementation.

An analysis carried out in the light of findings of Census 2011 reveals that nearly 54% of India's population is below 25 years of age and over 62% of the population is in the working-age group. Simultaneous studies and estimates by many independent agencies published during the same period show that every year more than 13 million Indians enter the working age. However, the country has an annual training capacity of 3 million on adding up all the training and educational capacities in ITIs, polytechnics, graduate colleges, professional colleges, etc. which amounts to nearly 4.69% of its total workforce eligible and interested for availing skill training and seeking gainful employment. Employment and Unemployment surveys (EUS) conducted by the National Sample Survey Organisation for 2011-12 estimated employment in the informal component to be about 75% of total usual status employment (principal and subsidiary) in the rural areas and 69% in urban areas. The figures for informal employment are likely to be even larger because enterprises identified as "employer's households", which account for employment like the provision of domestic services, are excluded from the definition of the informal sector. Concurrent skill gap reports suggest that over 109 million incremental human resources will be required in India alone, across 24 key sectors by the year 2022. Around 93% of India's workforce work in the unorganized sector and acquire skills through informal channels and lack formal certification. Hence, equipping India's skill training ecosystem to cope with these challenges became pertinent.

#### **PMKVY and RPL Interventions**

Keeping this not so welcoming a situation in view, opinion makers, both in and outside the establishment, advocated for conceptualizing and implementing such comprehensive policies and programmes that may enable the country to garner the demographic dividend in its favour which mean captivating almost one in 5 of the world's working age population by 2025 which will be Indian (18.3%). That required interventions - one is redesigning existing structure, course curriculum and system of accreditation of vocational and skill education in the country so that the persisting lacunas are sorted out, overall quality is improved to suit international standard and a more flexible system in terms of entry and exit is at place to enable scope for skill enhancement to all irrespective of their age group and academic background. The second intervention required is for institutional and infrastructural development, coordination between various agencies and stakeholders and finally for creating employment opportunities and an atmosphere conducive for encouraging youth to avail the newly created opportunities for enhancing their quality of life.

The first intervention came in terms of the adoption of National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF) which was the enhanced version of National Vocational Education Qualification Framework (NVEQF). Implementation of the National Skills Qualifications Framework (NSQF) has come up as a quality assurance framework and has helped to organize qualifications according to a series of levels of knowledge, skills and aptitude. These levels are defined in terms of learning outcomes which the learner must possess regardless of whether they are acquired through formal, non-formal or informal learning. The NSQF has helped in shifting the emphasis earlier accorded to inputs to outcome based learning - both in the general and vocational space and hence has improved the scope of employability and mobility of students. The credit accumulation and transfer system that has been integrated in NSQF will also allow people to move between education, vocational training and work at different stages in their lives according to their needs and convenience. It would also help in the alignment of Indian qualifications to international qualifications.

Apart from this, NSQF has facilitated the domain of vocational and skill education in the country with the concept of Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) that was largely missing in the present education and training scenario. RPL is a platform to provide recognition to the informal learning or learning through work to get equal acceptance as the formal levels of education. It aims to appreciate prior learning irrespective of the medium of achieving it. In short, RPL is a process of assessment of an individual's prior learning to give due importance to learning as an outcome rather than learning as process. To ensure that the candidates being assessed under RPL are also oriented to the standardized NSQF levels, QP-NOSs (Qualification Packs under National Occupational Standards) that would be followed under RPL will be same as the one followed under fresh training.

The second most important intervention was the adoption of a comprehensive policy towards Skilling India and thereby setting-up of a separate Ministry for Skill Development and Entrepreneurship (MSDE) on November 9, 2014 so that due focus is given to the enhancement of youth employability and all the efforts made in this

regard be consolidated. The Ministry for Skill Development and Entrepreneurship launched a flagship skill development scheme by the name Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana (PMKVY) to provide fresh impetus to competency based skill development in India. The objective of this skill certification and reward scheme is to enable and mobilize a large number of Indian youth to take-up outcome based skill training, become employable and earn their livelihood. This scheme is also targeted to addresses lack of industry driven competency based training institutions and hence to address some of the market failures pertaining to competency based training. The scheme was launched pan-India basis on July 15, 2015 on the occasion of World Youth Skills Day.

#### **PMKVY & RPL: The Mandate**

PMKVY has the mandate to improve productivity in the informal sector through creation of a pool of industry and National Skills Qualification Framework (NSQF) aligned skilled workforce. It also requires that at least 70% successfully assessed trainees are provided with wage employment. The scheme provides incentives to Training Providers for successfully attaining the required placement norms. Being a flagship skill development scheme, providing a significantly large pool of skilled manpower trained on industry aligned NSQF standards to informal sector for improved productivity is a key impact of this scheme.

# **PMKVY: Target, Implementation & Achievements**

The first year (2015-2016) of PMKVY scheme was utilized in setting the right foundations to further scale-up the scheme. Later on a target to benefit 24 lakh persons with training of 14 lakh fresh entrants and certification of 10 lakh persons under RPL within one year was set forth under PMKVY. Deliberations in the Parliament revealed that as on November 30, 2015 a sum total of 5289 candidates were enrolled in 65 training centres under PMKVY-RPL for 27 job roles developed by 17 Sector Skill Councils (SSCs) in 17 States and one Union Territory with the coverage of 50 districts.

A total of around 17.95 lakh people completed fresh trainings and 1.8 lakh people were up-skilled as part of RPL trainings in PMKVY-1. Owing to its successful first year implementation, the Union Cabinet approved the Scheme for another four years (2016 2020) to impart skilling 10 million youths of the country. Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana (2016 - 2020) called as PMKVY2.0 is a modified and improved version of PMKVY-1. It is now the flagship outcome-based Skill Training Scheme of the MSDE.

# **RPL: Implementation & Achievements**

Keeping in view the large training deficit calculated to be around 500 million people by 2022, the role of RPL component is also expected to play a vital role.

It may be noted that with the notification of NSQF, National Skill Development Agency (NSDA) decided to take-up pilot projects in select sectors for RPL along with NIOS and other important stakeholders. Against this backdrop a national level consultative workshop on "Strategy Planning for Implementing RPL for Informal Sector" was jointly organized by NSDA & NIOS on April 24, 2014 at NIOS Headquarters in NOIDA, Uttar Pradesh. The objective of the workshop was:

- 1. to understand the conceptual framework related to assessment and validation of the prior learning;
- 2. to gather International experiences on assessing prior learning in the context of developing labour force and education at all levels;
- 3. to gather the Indian experience from various stakeholders who have been engaged in RPL in India till date
- 4. to find out concern and issues related to related to assessment of prior learning and linking the same with the further learning continuum in a training and education set up;
- 5. to develop an action plan on RPL execution in the context of skill development and within the framework of NSQF in India;
- 6. to identify institutional responsibilities, including industries, on assessment and validation of the prior learning experiences in the context of developing empowered workforce.

The outcome of the workshop was selection of five sectors for RPL Pilot Study - Construction, Domestic workers, Jem's and Jewellery, Agriculture and Capital Goods and outline to conduct the pilot study.

Initially RPL Scheme was launched as a pilot in October 2014 across five States — Haryana, Telengana, Delhi, Odisha and Chhattisgarh in selected above said five sectors. As per the data of MSDE out of 507 workers pre-assessed 316 were recommended for training. On completion of the training period 181 appeared in final assessment and 174 declared as passed. When the outcome of pilot project was placed before the Parliamentary Committee the reason given for non-appearance of some of the trainees in final assessment was due to construction workers leaving their designated sites to other sites for want of better wages. This had happened despite the fact that workers selected for the scheme did not lose out on their wages for the duration of the training as the wage compensation for them was paid by the State Welfare Boards from the cess fund collected for workers welfare.

It has to be noted that RPL component of PMKVY primarily focuses on assessing and certifying the skills of informal sector workers and the government took several steps in this regard. For example, the government initiated skills development and certification initiative for the purpose of skills up-gradation of workers in the construction sector based on the concept of RPL. Beneficiaries of this scheme are the construction workers registered with State Labour Welfare Department. Expenses incurred towards training, assessment and wage compensation of these workers are to met from the Building and Other Construction Workers (BOCWs) Cess. The workers are pre-assessed as per the pre-

determined criteria on the basis of which they are provided skill gap training. Training Providers are reimbursed the training cost @ Rs. 30/- per hour per trainee and workers are given wage compensation at the rate of Rs. 35/- per hour per person.

In the First Phase of RPL the Steering Committee approved to allocate 3.58 lakh persons to 31 Sector Skill Councils. However, this target was revised to 5 lakh as given below:

However, it has been found that under PMKVY as on December 18, 2017, around 40.52 lakh persons have been trained which included 27.76 lakh under Short Term Training (STT), 7.76 lakh under RPL and 5 lakh under training in STT and RPL.

In order to popularize RPL even the President of India came forward and helped the Ministry in reaching out to 1500 employees at Rashtrapati Bhawan and certify them under RPL component of PMKVY, across 18 job roles. Many other organizations like Family Welfare Association (CWA) of CRPF took active part in popularizing the scheme in their operational areas. However, RPL is yet to get the recognition of a Tool in the Development of India. It requires due awareness generation amongst those who have received and are going to receive training through the means available in the informal sector of learning so that they can utilize the opportunity in a hassle free manner. Voluntary sector, if sensitized properly, can definitely bridge the gap.

Now I present the report of the year 2018. However, the report includes a few programmes held in December 2017 also which were not reflected in the Annual Report of that year.

# All India Adult Education Conference organized at the University of North Bengal, Siliguri

The 63rd All India Adult Education Conference jointly organized by Indian Adult Education Association, New Delhi and the Department of Lifelong Learning and Extension, University of North Bengal, Siliguri which was attended by 230 delegates from 18 states and UTs – Andhra Pradesh, Assam, Bihar, Gujarat, Haryana, Jammu & Kashmir, Kerala,



Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Meghalaya, Odisha, Rajasthan, Sikkim, Tamil Nadu, Tripura, Uttar Pradesh, West Bengal and NCT Delhi representing NGOs, CBOs, Universities, Colleges, State Resource Centres, Jan Shikshan Sansthans, Adult and

Lifelong Education practitioners, field functionaries and freelancers. The three day programme was divided into 13 plenary sessions and one general session. In plenary apart from Keynote Address, 47 papers based on empirical as well as experience based were presented. The general session provided an opportunity for brain storming on various issues related to Adult and Lifelong Education.

The inaugural session of the conference was held on November 27, 2018 at Rabindra Bhanu Mancha in the university campus which was inaugurated by the



Hon'ble Vice Chancellor, Dr. Subires Bhattacharyya by lighting the ceremonial lamp. Opening song (vandana) was rendered by a group of students. While Shri K.C.Choudhary, President, Indian Adult Education Association presiding this session, Dr. Dilip Kumar Sarkar, Registrar, North Bengal University was the Guest of Honour. Others on the dais were Dr. Sanchari Roy Mukharjee, Professor, Department of Economics & Dean,

Faculty Council for P.G. Studies in Arts, Commerce and Law, Dr. Bikas Chandra Paul, Professor, Department of Physics & Dean, Faculty Council for P.G. Studies in Science, Shri M.U.Alam, Head, Department of Lifelong Learning and Extension, Dr. Madan Singh, General Secretary and Dr.V.Mohankumar, Director, Indian Adult Education Association.

Shri M.U. Alam in his welcome address gave detailed information about the establishment and growth of his department by narrating the academic programmes and extension activities being organized / carried out and the major achievements made so far. He credited the achievements to the University for the best cooperation extended without which the department alone could not have done so much of work. He also thanked the Indian Adult Education Association for organizing the conference in association with his department and of



organizing the conference in association with his department and choosing the theme closer to the department's academic programmes for the benefit of both the fields - adult and lifelong education and rural development.



Dr. Dilip Kumar Sarkar in his address said how the University of North Bengal is playing a positive role in shaping the future of the students and scholars in the era of liberalization and globalization by suitably amending the need based curriculum and exposure to the success made in the field.

Dr. Sanchari Roy Mukharjee in her address expressed happiness that the conference is being organized in the

university campus for which the initial discussion was held in her presence in the month of July 2018. She said that such events are important for the university students as they provide ample opportunities for them to meet the delegates from different parts of



the country and to hear the papers presented based on the research topics and life experience or working in the field.



Dr. Bikas Chandra Paul in his speech said that education is an important tool for knowledge generation and knowledge upgradation, particularly in the event of globalized economy. Lifelong learning is a road map to upgrade the information by continuously acquiring the knowledge.

Dr. V. Mohankumar briefed the audience about the history of Indian Adult Education Association and how the organization has made a name for itself in the field

of adult and lifelong education for the last 79 years by organizing meetings, seminars, conferences, round tables and through publications propagating the policies and programmes of the government for providing literacy to the unlettered people.





Dr. Subires Bhattacharyya in his inaugural address said that the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 2030 are ambitious to bring an all round development in different fields which are of relevant and importance to common folk. As India also is a signatory for achieving these goals, country specific programmes need to be undertaken in a planned way with specific timeframe so that we can show to other countries that vast country with huge population is not a hindrance for development activities of the

nation. This conference is timely with appropriate topic as the theme, the outcome of which should be helpful to the field of literacy, lifelong education and rural development.

Shri K.C.Choudhary in his presidential address said that how the Departments of Adult, Continuing Education and Extension were established in the university system with the initiative taken by Dr. Mohan Sinha Mehta when he was the Vice Chancellor, Rajasthan University, Jaipur and President, Indian Adult Education Association. The basic objective was not only to make adult education as a

subject of study in higher education but also to create a cadre with the professionally qualified teachers and field functionaries apart from providing opportunities for the students to gain experience by organizing literacy classes in the community. Though, many universities established the departments enthusiastically in the beginning, in course of time the steam lost and today only a few universities continue to have the departments. Unfortunately, the



government also did not use the services of professionally qualified students who came out of the departments successfully completing Master's Degree in Adult Education in the adult education programmes implemented in the country which almost defeated the basic objective of establishing the Departments of Adult Education in higher education.

This session was devoted to Keynote Address which was delivered by Dr. Arun Kanti Jana, Professor, Department of Political Science, University of North Bengal on the topic "The State and Rural Development: The Issue of Poverty Alleviation and Literacy in Independent India ". In his address he explained in detail about various government initiatives to mitigate poverty alleviation in rural India like land reforms, green revolution, Jawahar Gram Samridhi Yojana, Swarn Jayanti Gram Swarozgar Yojana, Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme, etc. He also touched upon low literacy in rural areas though schools are opened almost in all the villages and the primary education is in mission mode. He concluded his address by stating that the experience with rural development through poverty alleviation measures and spread of literacy and adult education had been sluggish in India because of the marginal importance given by successive governments since independence. The concern of the state in recent years, more particularly since 1991, had mainly been economic growth and this concern will not be able to take the country to attain the objective of sustainable development which is one of the objectives of United Nations development programme.

Subsequently, the remaining 12 plenary sessions were held in Humanities Building both in Room No. 109 and Smart Classroom of Department of Lifelong Learning and Extension.



Dr. Sanchari Roy Mukharjee in her valedictory address stressed the need and importance of adult education as children in large number dropout of the school for various reasons and remain as illiterates. A vast country like India with large number of illiterates cannot progress well and make social welfare programmes a success. Participation of all sections of society is important for achieving inclusive growth. Unfortunately, while all other sectors of education are given priority in fund allocation, adult education sector gets meager amount due to which there is always a shortfall in the end re



meager amount due to which there is always a shortfall in the end result.

Illiteracy in rural areas is much more than the urban areas. Rural areas are equally

important as they control and manage the rural economy which is important for the development of the country. The governments, both central and states, formulate a number of schemes focusing on rural areas but the success rate is not encouraging. This may be due to people either not aware of the schemes or not able to get the schemes because of lack of education. This can be rectified by bringing them to the education fold through adult education classes wherein they can learn literacy and get awareness inputs on various aspects which are of immediate importance to their day-to-day life.

She also narrated a life experience about her grandmother who was married at the young age of 12 and hence, she could not attend school and remained as an illiterate though grandfather was the Head Master of a school. However, she was taught the basic literacy at the age of 22 by grandfather after three children were born which enabled the grandmother to read Mahabharata which was closely observed and admired by Dr. Sanchari as a child. This made her to study well only to read Mahabharata like her grandmother. She said today she has reached a much greater heights and holds the position of Dean in the prestigious North Bengal University.



Thereafter, Prof. L. Raja, Department of Lifelong Learning and Extension, Gandhigram Rural Institute (Deemed to be University), Gandhigram, Tamil Nadu read the following Siliguri Conference Declaration and Recommendations which was unanimously passed by the delegates:

#### **Declaration and Recommendation**

The Sixty Third All India Adult Education Conference was jointly organized by Indian Adult Education Association, New Delhi and the Department of Lifelong Learning and Extension, University of North Bengal at Siliguri from November 27-29, 2018in which 230 delegates participated from Andhra Pradesh, Assam, Bihar, Gujarat, Haryana, Jammu & Kashmir, Kerala, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Meghalaya, Odisha, Rajasthan, Sikkim, Tamil Nadu, Tripura, Uttar Pradesh, West Bengal and NCT Delhi representing NGOs, CBOs, Universities, Colleges, State Resource Centres, Jan Shikshan Sansthans, Adult and Lifelong Education practitioners, field functionaries and freelancers. The three days programme was divided into 14 plenary sessions and one general session. In plenary apart from keynote address, 47 papers based on empirical as well as experience based were presented. The general session provided an opportunity to have brain storming on various issues related to Adult and Lifelong Education.

After in-depth discussion the delegates of the conference reiterated their commitment to Adult and Lifelong Education which is a must not only to make India literate but also to become a developed country in all fields. Hence, the delegates unanimously decided to support, propagate and facilitate people to become literate and further their education and learning to basic, secondary and beyond through formal and non-formal system of education for being an integral part of inclusive

growth and over all development to meet the target set in SDG 4. Hence,

- The delegates eagerly look for the early announcement of the New Education Policy by the GOI in which the policy and programmes for Adult and Lifelong Education also should be a part.
- As India is a vast country with large number of illiterate population, one standard strategy alone cannot make the country literate. Hence, multiple strategies need to be adopted for intensive coverage in stipulated time frame with adequate provision for continuing education through institutional approach.
- Also government alone cannot make the country literate. So it may be appropriate to involve large number of institutions including schools, colleges, universities, NGOs and CBOs to actively participate.
- Good infrastructure in terms of institutions like State Literacy Mission Authorities and State Resource Centres have been created and developed as part of Adult and Continuing Education implemented in the country since 1978. They have provided good administrative and academic support to Literacy programmes so far. In view of their success in supporting the programmes for long and also of their proven ability, their services should be continued to be utilized in future also.
- The policy of government of India today is to make the country a front line supplier of trained manpower both for the domestic needs and also of the countries. To achieve this, the education at all levels must be properly linked to vocational skill development training programmes.
- A lot of focus is given for rural development to create infrastructure, employment generation and empowerment. As illiteracy is comparatively much more in rural areas than in urban, the focus should be to make people not only literate but also adequate opportunities should be provided to further their education for better sustainability so that they are able to effectively participate in the development process.
- Research and Development are important components of progress.
   Unfortunately the field of Adult and Lifelong Education has been deprived so far
   of any quality research. Hence, the University Departments of Adult, Continuing
   Education and Extension may be strengthened and funded more to undertake
   extension work in the community and conduct quality research which will be of
   use to the field.

Shri H.C.Parekh in his address appreciated Indian Adult Education Association and the Department of Lifelong Learning and Extension, University of North Bengal for organizing the conference successfully with an appropriate theme. He also appreciated adequate opportunities given to Research Scholars to share their papers in the plenary sessions which will go a long way to polish the quality and content of the papers. He suggested that in future more opportunities



can be given to the delegates to share their views either in general session or in group work so that their rich experience is known to everyone.



Shri K. C. Choudhary, President, Indian Adult Education Association in his address requested NGOs to make adult education as an important part of their activities within their own budget as there is delay on the part of the government to announce the policy and programmes of adult education. NGOs also should provide adequate opportunities for continuing education so that basic literacy skills acquired are further improved to enable the neo literates to take-up equivalency programmes.



In the beginning Dr. Madan Singh, General Secretary, Indian Adult Education Association gave welcome address and at the end Shri M.U.Alam, Head, Department of Lifelong Learning and Extension, University of North Bengal proposed the vote of thanks.

# **Meeting on "Adult Education"**

In view of adult education programmes under Saakshar Bharat came to an end by March 31, 2018 and no new programme was officially launched for implementation at the field level (though different sources say the next adult education programme is **Padna Likhna Abhiyan**), IAEA organized a meeting on April 10, 2018 to have brainstorming with the Delhi based Life Members of IAEA.



The aim of this meeting was to analyze the status of adult education programme in the country and future programme of action. Following is the gist of the discussion:

- The achievements made by NLM should not go waste and hence, proper followup needs to be in place to enable the neo-literates continue to have in touch with the literacy skills leading to self-learning.
- Digital literacy should be encouraged for wider implementation.
- Adult education should be an integral part of the framework of education with equal importance to like that of other streams of education. Adult education also should get adequate financial allocation, good infrastructure, trained manpower, standardized curriculum, proper examination system and certification by competent authority with equivalency.
- Skill training and literacy should be a combined one so that persons undergoing vocational skill training are complete in respect of education and skill.
- So far the achievement made in adult education programmes are projected in the number of persons made literate (Basic Literacy Skill). Unless the learners reach the level of self-learning, we cannot make a learning society. Hence, continuing education/lifelong learning is equally important like basic literacy.
- Student youths should be encouraged to choose MA Adult Education/ Lifelong Learning as a subject of study and also for inter-disciplinary research.
- Given the large number of illiterates in the country, adult education programme
  cannot achieve the desired results as a government driven programme. Hence,
  it may be appropriate that NGOs which have proven record of success in the
  field of education, community development, social service are also involved so
  that the coverage is more.

research and evaluation studies and journals) available in the Amarnath Jha Library



#### **IGNOU Term End Examinations Conducted**





Board of RAI. Dr.V.Mohankumar, Director and Smt. Kalpana Kaushik, Deputy Director were also present.


## **Obituary**


